DATA FILE:

Organization-year data on founding year; membership structure; headquarters location; goals; ties to intergovernmental organizations; ties to nongovernmental organizations; and country-location of members is saved in .csv format as TSMOD_ver2.csv. Data are provided for 1953, 1959, 1961, 1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971, 1973, 1977, 1981, and then every odd-numbered year up to 2013.

CODING DESCRIPTION:

TSMOD is an extension to 2013 of Smith and Wiest's (2012) biennial 1953-2003 data on the population of transnational social movement organizations (TSMOs). Using the *Yearbook of International Organization*, Smith and Wiest collected a wide range of information about TSMOs, a subset of international nongovernmental organizations defined by their explicit efforts to alter some aspect of the status quo. In 2013, Smith and Hughes did a comprehensive search of alternate years of the 2004/2005 through 2012/2013 editions of the *Yearbook* for new or previously-unidentified TSMOs to add to the dataset. From 2012-2014, Duncan managed process of updating the existing biennial dataset on the population of TSMOs. From 2014 to the present, Plummer has managed the process of tracing the newly-added TSMOs backward in time and merging new data into the existing population dataset. Undergraduate and graduate student coders were employed to code selected yearbook entries based on the following codebook and instructions. Research assistants who helped us with entering organizational records and other tasks related to building this database include: Basak Gemici, Caitlin Schroering, Matthew Hemphill, Joshua McDermott, Sarah Khalbuss, Veronica Trimiño, Hannah Svonavec, Eva Dice, Gregory Hollinger, and Gaurav Gupta-Casale.

The Yearbook of International Organizations is the source of all data in TSMOD. The Yearbook of International Organizations is edited by the Union of International Associations (UIA), which was formally mandated by the United Nations to assemble a database of all existing international and transnational organizations—by UIA's definition, this includes all organizations of different national governments and/or residents from at least three countries. Responsible authorities within each organization are asked to complete an annual questionnaire that details the organization's work, its members, links to international organizations and NGOs, among other information. The UIA editors conduct web searches and other research to supplement organizational surveys and to determine whether a group that fails to report on its activities over multiple years remains active. Inactive groups and cases where the editors establish that a group has disbanded are noted in the Yearbook entries. We have noted that over time, the comprehensiveness of the UIA's records has improved, as the internet and changes in international organizational practices have made it easier to identify international organizations. In addition, the time between a group's formation and entry into the Yearbook has been reduced.

TSMOD is available publicly to researchers in an organization-year format. The organization-year dataset contains the variables as described below. Each organization is identified by a unique ID (seriesid).

A NOTE ON TSMO-YEAR MISSINGNESS

The dataset includes two categories of TSMO-Year missingness:

- 1. Coder-Identified/Specified Missing TSMO-Years
 - a. In these cases, coders identified that the TSMO was missing or classified as dead or inactive in a given year
 - b. We created a dummy variable—missingdummy—to indicate years where coders identified a TSMO as missing, dead, or inactive.
- 2. Unidentified Missing TSMO-Years:
 - a. In these cases, in a given year or years there was coder error or oversight and TSMOs were not coded; they were absent entirely from the dataset.
 - b. To handle cases of unidentified missingness, we carried forward data from the last-coded year up to two yearbook years and generated a dummy variable—fillyear—to indicate TSMO-years that were carried forward. For example, in the table below Amis de Ceso was identified and coded in 2001, 2003, and 2009, but it was not identified in 2005 and 2007. We carried forward the data from 2003 to 2005 and 2007 and flagged these years with fillyear. We never carried forward more than two yearbook years. That is, if 2009 had also been unidentified we would not have filled forward in 2009; it would have remained absent from the dataset.
